# From the Founder's Desk



## Dear Friend of Pacta,

Another year in the books. 2025 has been a year of building conviction for the work we do, resonance with those we work and patience to wait for the path to emerge, despite our passion and impatience.

As I look back, I feel fulfilled by the richness of opportunities that came our way. I have gratitude for the choices that we could make and pride for the outcomes of those opportunities and choices. I am deeply appreciative of team Pacta that has rallied us through the year's ups and downs.

Pacta has offered legal services for eight years now. This year, I encountered a basic question - why does Pacta work in legal for social impact? I have always viewed our role beyond simple service provisioning. But something clearer has emerged:

Social welfare laws exist to set minimum standards, correct responses when harm has occurred, check concentrated power. But the same law lands very differently on a large, well-resourced, legally staffed institution and a small, but well-intentioned, resource-constrained non-profit. For smaller under-resourced institutions, compliance adds disproportionate cost, becomes punitive rather than enabling and drains energy away from mission. Compliance has become a proxy for credibility and is demanded by funders, governments, corporates, which are more powerful actors. Compliance has now become a weapon or gatekeeping device. Even though regulation is meant to restore balance, it reproduces imbalance.



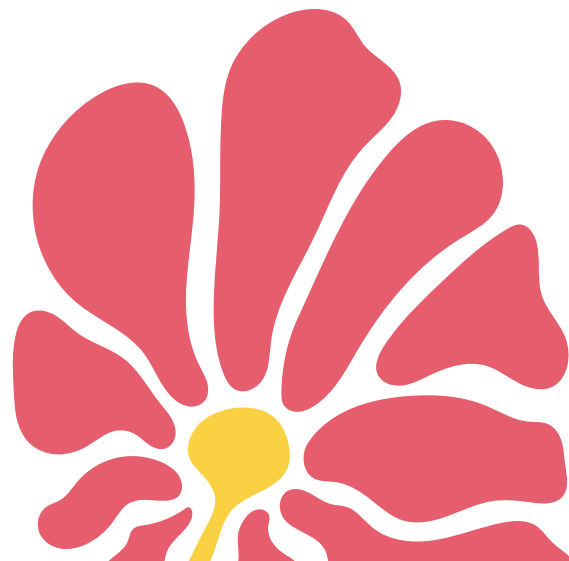
## And this is where I see Pacta's role:

- **As Translator**, making law legible, and helping small actors understand what actually matters
- **As Buffer** absorbing some of the compliance burden on behalf of those that are making the world better
- **As Changemaker** at the policy & regulatory level, and with funders to see risk, power asymmetry, intent, and social value contextually

With this clarity and gratitude, a calmness and slowness also arrived. I figured that our work demands depth, patience and creativity, and those cannot be forced, they emerge from time and repetition, and this is what I expect the upcoming year to hold for us.

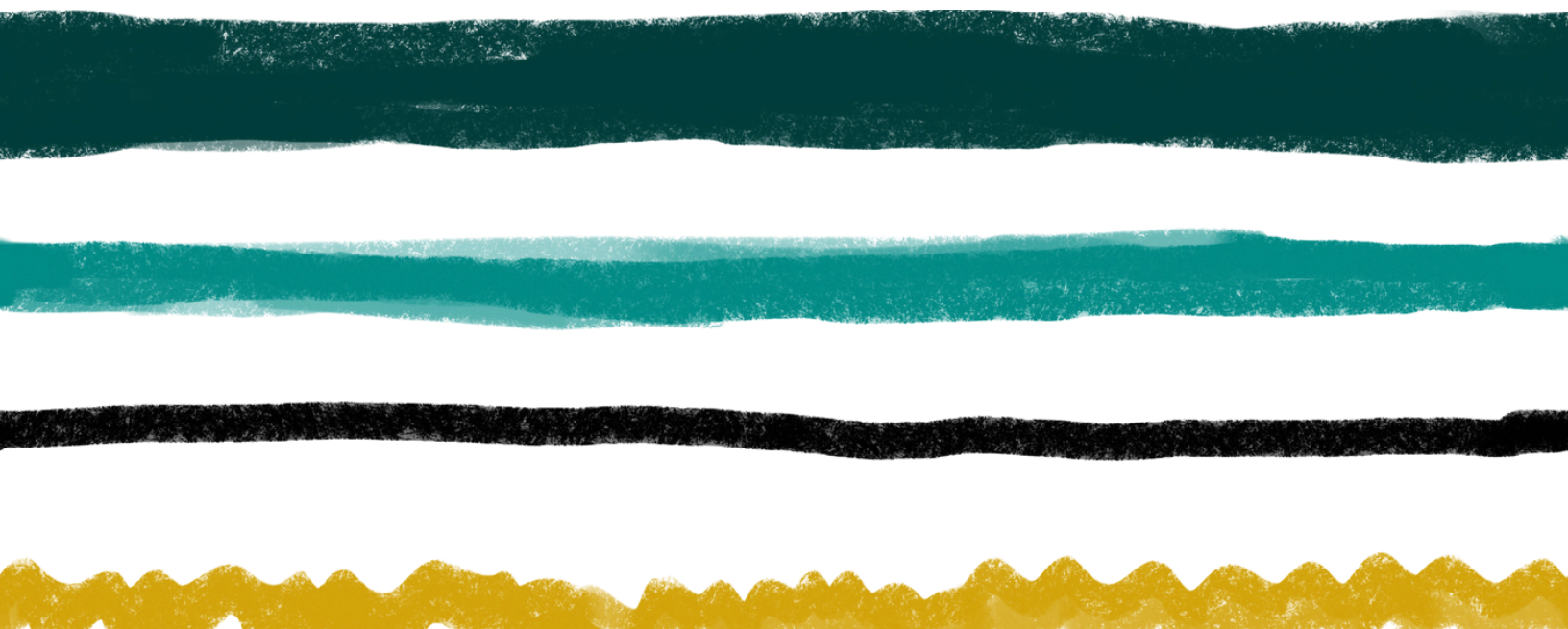
On that note, I wish you, dear reader, a year filled with good pauses, great art and immense joy!

# About Pacta

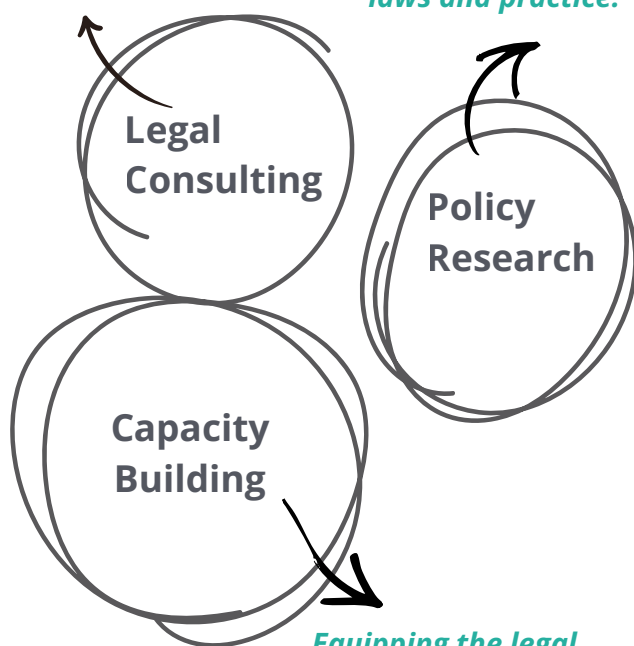
## Who We Are

Pacta is a Bengaluru-based law firm and think tank working to reduce inequities by closing the gap between the intent and implementation of laws and policies.

Pacta's work is organised across three core areas:

*Strengthening non-profits' operations, strategies, and programmes.*

*Developing practical, localised, and interdisciplinary evidence to address gaps between laws and practice.*



*Equipping the legal understanding of changemakers to improve their impact.*

## Our Vision

# Pacta's Core Values

- **Equity in Practice**

We recognise that law, regulation, and compliance do not land evenly. Pacta works to ensure that rules correct power imbalances rather than reproduce them—especially for under-resourced institutions and communities.

- **Legibility as Justice**

Understanding is a form of power. We believe that making law, data, and governance legible is essential to justice, agency, and meaningful participation in public systems.

- **Intent with Reinforcements**

Good intentions matter—but they must be reinforced with sound structures. Pacta helps translate social purpose into legally and ethically responsible institutional practice.

- **Power-Aware Rigor**

We treat law, data, and technology as tools shaped by power, not neutral instruments. Our work combines analytical rigor with a clear-eyed view of who benefits, who bears risk, and who decides.

- **Depth, Patience, and Care**

Durable change requires time. We value slowness, repetition, and care—for institutions, people, and ideas—believing that thoughtful work sustains social purpose over the long term.

- We wrote a strategic paper on the challenges presented in creating and running of the network
- We supported the development of a theory of change, an outcomes framework and a risk mitigation plan

#### iv. Pacta's disability law and policy research practice with a data lens



Our seminal work on access to justice for persons with disabilities **secured a remarkable foreword by the former Chief Justice of India, Dr. Justice D.Y. Chandrachud**



Our work in **disability data** matured as our hands-on expertise in studying **Unique Disability ID (UDID) access** was **commissioned by Youth4Jobs** to baseline UDID access for their beneficiaries across seven districts in Maharashtra.



Our essay **featured in the India Justice Report 2025**



Pacta **added nine reports** to its rich and growing body of resources across **education, budgets, access to public spaces, and the legal capacity of persons with disabilities** examined through a legal and data lens



Our “Access to Justice for Persons with Disabilities” report and the launch event of it **received coverage in at least 15 newspapers and periodicals**



We will continue our work in the disability sector, actively seeking funding support and strengthening our ability to pursue independent disability research



Pacta is **exploring a key partnership** with a large Indian OPD **to launch a research fellowship programme** for small- to mid-sized non-profits working in the disability sector, allowing them to use research to inform their programme, fundraising and advocacy strategies



**Pacta's position:** We are scoping out directions but remain convinced of maintaining a data-driven and creative take on access to justice for persons with disabilities





## v. Pacta's advisory on legal and ethical risks in AI, data, and digitisation



Pacta's work in legal and ethical risk mitigation in AI adoption for non-profits complements the legal advisory across DPDP compliance, digitisation, and free and open-source approaches



Pacta advised ten clients on strengthening their institutional and programmatic compliance with the DPDP Act



**Pacta's observation for action:** There is a compliance-level conformity to the DPDP, but deeper implications and the spirit of the law—such as meaningful data rights literacy and data-power negotiation—remain less addressed in the Indian civil society discourse



**Pacta's observation for action:** Patterns of AI adoption across the spectrum and between the extremes of AI hype and AI fear



**Pacta's position:** While we are not tech or software experts, we feel strongly about fostering data and technology sovereignty through indigenous investments and funding



**Pacta's observation for action:** Data architecture changes with purpose - is it possible to build data pipelines that serve several users at once?



## vi. Pacta's creative practice using data and stories as tools for collective sense-making and dialogue



Pacta discovered 'data walks' as a potent and inviting methodology of immersing with data (through GivingTuesday)

- Pacta pioneered multiple data walks by offering data viewings of our work in disability budgets, CSR & Sports, and access to education for children with disabilities



Art also emerged as a strong directional thread

- We experienced an outpouring of appreciation for Kimaya's Home, our commissioned graphic story (authored by Roeqin) on the legal capacity of persons with disabilities

- The data walks facilitated multi-stakeholder sense-making and surfaced potential consequences of implementation gaps and action roadmaps

- We hosted a workshop on World Disability Day featuring a read-aloud of Kimaya's Home, followed by a zine-making session that invited participants to reflect on autonomy in decision-making in their own lives and for persons with disabilities

# Highlights from Legal Practice

Pacta's legal practice supports non-profits, social enterprises, and hybrid entities with end-to-end legal advisory, combining sector expertise with practical guidance to navigate regulatory requirements, mitigate risks, and implement robust governance frameworks.

## Our work spans:

*This year, Pacta strengthened its role as a trusted legal and risk advisor, delivering workshops, consultations, and capacity-building sessions, while open-access primers and resources helped democratise legal knowledge.*

## i) Blended Finance for Low Income Housing

Pacta worked in collaboration with Community Design Agency (CDA) to create a framework for the government, philanthropists, companies, developers, social impact investors and the community itself to work together to build and sustain affordable housing. **The framework looked at how funding would be generated and housed, who would be responsible at each step of the construction process and how the community could continue living there and sustain themselves.**

## ii) Strengthening DPDP Compliance

Pacta worked closely with several partners such as M.S. Swaminathan Research Foundation, British Asian Trust, Arghyam, among others to set up structures to ensure meaningful compliance with the Digital Personal Data Protection (DPDP) Act and rules framed thereunder. Pacta also released primers and held capacity building sessions available to the public to democratise knowledge about data privacy and help non-profits stay compliant.

**iii) Closed-door Consultation**

Pacta was invited to a closed-door consultation session by the Karnataka Health Promotion Trust to discuss the implications of the FCRA Rules amendment passed in May 2025, including its potential impact on non-profit publications and associated compliance obligations.

**iv) Governance of Collectives**

Pacta was invited to lead a session for the various partners of the Rainfed Livestock Network to help the partners understand and gain experience in organising a governance framework for a collaborative NGO network. This was a step forward in building networks that can work together while growing in a structured fashion.

**v) Institutional Set-up & Advisory**

Pacta enhanced its capacity as a risk advisor by supporting non-profits in setting up their organisations. Pacta helped existing non-profit organisations set up for-profit entities to allow them to earn revenue through products they generate, and also put governance structures in place for these hybrid models. Pacta also assisted non-profits such as Boito and Climate Educators Network in setting up Trusts.

**vi) Pro Bono Legal Advisory**

During the year, Pacta strengthened its role as a trusted pro bono legal and risk advisor to the non-profit sector, supporting organisations at different stages of their journey— from helping early-stage organisations set up appropriate legal structures to advising established organisations on governance, compliance, and risk management.

**vii) Documentation & Strategy**

As part of its commitment to improving legal literacy and compliance within the non-profit ecosystem, Pacta helped several non-profits in developing policies and template documentation to ease operations. This included creating an FCRA utilisation policy for Ashoka Trust for Research in Ecology and Environment, and template documentation for the Circle, Aikyam and MSSRF.

**viii) Open-source Resources**

Pacta also published other open-source resources this year, including a primer on the Maternity Benefit Act, an annual Compliance Calendar, and a series on the new Labour Codes.

These primers aim to explain the law in simple terms and outline compliance requirements for non-profit organisations.

## i) AI Adoption In India's Social Sector



- **Virtual Data Walk on how Indian Organisations are navigating AI Readiness (Jan 29, 2025)**

A Virtual Data Walk hosted by GivingTuesday examined how Indian organisations are navigating AI readiness, with Pacta contributing qualitative insights from research on AI deployment in the social sector





- **Report on AI Adoption in Indian Social Sector Programs: Early Insights, Emerging Stakeholders and Future Directions ( Published in May, 2025)**

The report explores the motivations, models, risks, and practical realities of AI deployment in non-profit programmes



- **Convening on Dissecting Equity in AI Adoption For Social Impact (May 29, 2025, Bengaluru)**

Anchored in insights from AI Adoption in Indian Social Sector Programmes: Early Insights, Emerging Stakeholders and Future Directions, the convening explored the motivations, models, risks, and practical realities of using AI in non profit programmes in India.

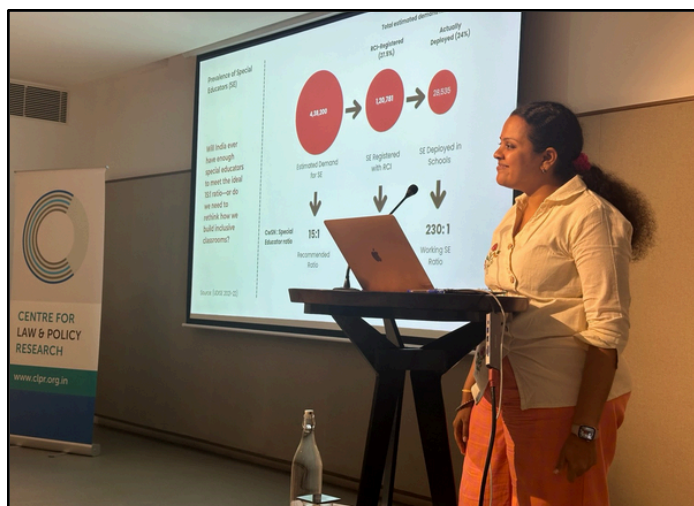

# Highlights from Capacity Building Practice

Pacta empowers non-profits, social enterprises, and social sector professionals through targeted training, workshops, and knowledge-sharing initiatives. This year, our capacity-building efforts focused on strengthening organisations and sector stakeholders with practical tools to navigate legal and regulatory frameworks, enhance governance and risk management, and implement emerging policies such as the DPDP Rules and FCRA amendments.

## i) Learning Spaces



Learning Spaces is Pacta's flagship legal and compliance workshops tailored to the social sector. By equipping non-profits with the tools and knowledge to address legal challenges, Pacta empowers organisations to operate effectively and maximise their impact on the communities they serve.

### July 26, 2025, Webinar

Pacta held an online session to help non-profits manage their fixed assets. This session provided information on applicable laws with respect to investments and holding assets and how returns from such assets may be used.

### August 21 & 22, 2025, Bengaluru

Pacta hosted a two-day legal compliance workshop at the Bangalore International Centre (BIC) for finance, admin, and legal professionals in the social sector, covering FCRA, GST, and labour compliance, with interactive toolkits, checklists, and a Compliance Tracker Sheet.

### November 22, 2025, Webinar

Pacta hosted a webinar on FC-4 filing, guiding participants through the process of completing annual returns. The session covered reporting utilisation, carrying forward administrative expenses, and accounting for interest earned, where applicable.

## ii) Foreign Contribution (Regulation) Act (FCRA) Compliance

- **India Partner Network (November 27, 2025, Webinar)**

Pacta, in collaboration with India Partner Network (IPN) hosted a session introducing key compliance requirements of the Foreign Contribution (Regulation) Act (FCRA) for non-profits, focusing on how to correctly receive, utilise, report, and account for foreign funds, with special attention to administrative expense caps, annual filings, and rules on publishing and dissemination of research or communication materials.

## iii) Digital Personal Data Protection (DPDP) Regulations

- **My Data My Rules, January 26, 2025, Online**

Pacta, in collaboration with Civis, facilitated a session on the draft DPDP Rules 2025 at the Citizen Digital Foundation Youth Dialogue Forum, explaining key provisions and their potential impact on citizens' rights.

- **Balancing Privacy and Agency, February 10, 2025, New Delhi**

Panel discussion organised by Quantum Hub on the DPDP's impact on children and persons with disabilities.

- **Impact of Digital Data Protection (DPDP) Rules on the Social Sector, February 13, 2025, Online**

Pacta facilitated a DPDP consultation hosted by RNP, guiding non-profit partners on obligations under the Draft Rules, addressing sector-specific queries, and encouraging participation in the Ministry's feedback process.

- **Shakti Sprints: Moving Ideas for Justice, December 5&6, 2025, Jaipur**

Pacta facilitated a session on the Digital Personal Data Protection Act in collaboration with Outlawd at Agami.

- **Pacta's Comments to MEITY**

Pacta submitted comments to the Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology (MEITY) on the Draft DPDP Rules, highlighting challenges for smaller non-profits and suggesting amendments to ease compliance while ensuring accessibility for persons with disabilities.

## iv) Project Governance and Risk Mitigation

Conducted a capacity-building session in collaboration with the Institute of Company Secretaries of India (ICSI) focused on strengthening project governance and risk mitigation strategies for organisations in the social sector. The session aimed to equip participants with a practical understanding of how to design and implement governance frameworks that support effective project execution while minimising legal, financial, and operational risks.

# Self-Learning & Team Strengthening

At Pacta, learning is embedded in our day to day work. One of the ways we hold space for this is through our Weekly Reflections. Held on Wednesdays, these are informal sessions where the team comes together to discuss a quote, a legal or policy issue, or a question that has emerged from our work. The sessions are led by different members of the team, with topics varying from week to week. Some sessions focus closely on ongoing projects, while others open up broader discussions around law, justice, ethics, or practice. What matters most is the opportunity for the team to pause, listen, and reflect together.

While much of Pacta's work focuses on advocacy and capacity building with external stakeholders, these sessions ensure that we are practising the same commitment within the organisation. They help strengthen shared understanding, encourage critical engagement, and build a sense of collective ownership over our work.

Building on this emphasis on internal learning, Pacta conducted a capacity building programme during the year, led by Gomathy Balasubramanian, Research Lead at Pacta, with participation from across the team. The programme was designed to strengthen our collective ability to undertake rigorous qualitative research. It drew on the teachings of Sri Aurobindo, particularly around attention, awareness, and ethical engagement, and explored how these ideas can be navigated while conducting research. Alongside this, the sessions engaged with other authors and research approaches, prompting deeper reflection on research design, positionality, and responsibility.

These conversations helped deepen how the team approaches research, reinforcing a shared commitment to thoughtful, ethical, and reflective practice across Pacta's work.


This has strengthened the link between research, law, and policy within the organisation, supporting more grounded analysis and more considered engagement with the systems and communities Pacta works with.
